Meeting Called To Order

Commodore Mark Willis called the meeting to order at 6:53pm. Mark asked for everyone to introduce themselves around the room to the group.

Treasurer's report:

Nancy Feichtmeier reported that the checking account balance is \$3,186. This is before the transfer of funds from the Pewaukee Boat Show, and after a transfer of \$1,500 to the new International Boat Show account. Membership dues should start coming in from ACBS in January, 2017.

Membership Update:

Gayle Ritter reminded everyone to renew their membership in ACBS, with Glacier Lakes as your primary Chapter.

Board Elections:

Mark pointed out some discrepancies in the Chapter By-Laws' Officer Structure. The board recommends that we make a revision to the By-Laws and Constitution making the Membership Chair a Chapter Officer, elected annually for one year without limit on number of terms.

Proposed changes in Article 1, Officers: Subsection D: Eliminate Lines 2 and 6, Subsection E: Eliminate Line 7. Add F. The Membership Chair(s) shall:

- 1. Maintain a current list of all members
- 2. Send out Welcome Letter to new members
- 3. Maintain and update a list of the membership and forward a revised copy to Commodore and Secretary.

The board also recommends we have our chapter officers and directors' positions match what is described in our By-Laws and Constitution:

Four Directors elected by general membership

Gayle Ritter and Judy Wagner. Directors to be elected are: Dan Holdmann; Howard Schneider; Cliff Muehlenberg; Jane Larson.

Directors at Large appointed by the Commodore are: Bob Stoltz, Bill Freyman, and John Baas.

Roberta Hegy moved to ratify the slate of officers and directors, with the term year 11/1/16 to 10/31/17. Karl Johns seconded it, and all approved.

Old Business: Storage Issue

Commodore Willis brought up the subject of purchasing a large enclosed trailer to store the Chapter's display materials, including 2 trailers, tents and transom podium. That would eliminate the storage expense currently \$65/month. The trailer should be a 16' V-nose or 18' box big enough for the tent poles. Used roadworthy enclosed trailers could cost \$3-4,000, and then we could sell our old trailers. Discussion included the question of where to store it. It has to be accessible by a large towing vehicle in January for the Milwaukee Boat Show, so the area has to be plowable. Mark asked if anyone knows of a used trailer, let him know. Karl Johns will look into a trailer dealership in Hartford.

Upcoming events:

Milwaukee Marine Dealers Boat Show at State Fair Park: John Baumann will again run our part of this show, to be held from Friday, Jan.20th to Sunday, Jan.29th, 2017 (closed on Monday & Tuesday). Boats are needed to display. Contact Charlie Shong or John if your boat is available. We will discuss this at the Jan. 8th brunch meeting at the Delafield Brewhaus. ACBS Quarterly Meeting: March 23, 2017 in Tavares, Florida Madison Boat Show at Christy's Landing: August 4-5, 2017. Mark Walters reported that the 2016 show raised \$8,500.00 with Clean Lakes Alliance getting most of the proceeds. Possibility of Shepherd being the feature boat next year. Pewaukee Boat Show: August 19, 2017.

Collector Boat Registration:

Mark Walters has been working with the state legislature to change the policy on 50 years and older classic boats' registration to be like classic cars, a one-time fee for the license. The legislator he was working with is not running for re-election, so he is working with a second politician.

President's Cup Award Presentation:

Commodore Willis presented this award to Mark Walters, for his work on the Madison Boat Show, being Past Commodore, and his efforts towards a Collector Boat License. Also, John Constable (not present) for his outstanding work on the Pewaukee Boat Show posters.

RESTORING A 1939 CENTURY THUNDERBOLT

This story actually begins in 1987. It involves a long time member, hearty Glacier Lake volunteer and general enthusiast for old things. Any and All old things. That member would be Karl Johns. In 1987 Karl purchased for the sum total of \$3,000.00 a 1938 Century Thunderbolt. Now many of you may not have even heard of a Century Thunderbolt. There is quite a history to the Century Boat Company's racing heritage – and the Thunderbolt was kind of a last stand. Karl's version was actually introduced in 1938 and it is 15'6" long. We measured it. As far as we can tell (We being Century historians, of a sort), Century built between 12 & 15 of these in 1938. They may be built another 5

or 6 in 1939 and rumor has it a couple snuck out the door as 1940's, but that was it. There may be 3-4 of them left and Karl's is one of those. Another story will spell out in more detail how Karl acquired the boat. This story is just about what happened to it in the past several weeks.

This tale started innocently enough on the night of the recently held Spring Dinner meeting. David Doyle invited Karl & Sue Schroeder up to his place on Silver Lake for a pre-dinner cocktail. The event was being held at Timmer's Resort – just one lake over on Big Cedar Lake. As Dave was planning on riding with me, he had no choice but to invite me for the social activities pre-dinner.

As we relaxed around the table in Dave's place overlooking the lake, Karl happened to mention that he wanted to get his Century Thunderbolt done. When he first acquired the boat, Karl had begun disassembly and then other things got in the way and he put the project aside. Eventually the

Thunderbolt was stored away to be used (not intentionally) as a haven for the local raccoon population.

Karl has been known to hold tight to his coins. Thus it was he mentioned that a couple of loose estimates he had received seemed quite high. He looked at Dave Doyle and said something to the effect of: "Dave – why don't you do my boat?" Dave looked at me and said something to the effect of: "Well, Jack's the Century expert, why don't you have him do it?" This all happened in a flash. Yet – by the time we arrived at Timmer's for the social hour there – it was the topic of

conversation between the four of us. And.....I was determined that I was going to do that boat. Well – it was the social hour!

So Karl arranged for us to go look at the boat so I could begin to assemble an estimate. Didn't much matter because both Karl and I knew he was going to get a deal? On April 11th I drove to Karl's house and he and I trekked out to see the Thunderbolt. We could actually see it against the back wall. There were many pieces of heavy farm machinery blocking our way. However, we persevered. After as thorough as inspection as we could do at the time, we drove over to see the farmer who owned the barn and try and figure out what was necessary to get the boat out.

Not much as it turns out. So – I shot Karl an estimate and he agreed to it and then proceeded to contact the farmer to arrange for us to collect the boat. We would do so on Thursday, the 19th. Not bad as it were – conception to fruition in two and one-half weeks.

So, Thursday morning came and I drove down to meet Karl at his place. I had borrowed my son's Chevy Silverado to help with the task. Karl had assembled a vast assortment of tools to help with the job. We had extension cords. We had a small compressor. We had a jack stand and a trailer dolly. We had a tool box, and we had our wits about us. Well.....one might argue that. After all, neither Karl nor I are as young as we once were. Problem is we don't know that, so we barreled ahead anyway.

Arriving at the barn we found all the machinery cleared out. We could now walk straight back to the boat and uncover it. Using the trailer dolly, the whole rig moved forward surprisingly easy for something that had not moved at all in so long. Karl checked the tires and aired them up. I strapped down the boat and we hooked her up and pulled her into daylight. And.....there was a whole lot more "Coon Poop" in the bilge of that boat than we thought there was. Great biguh well.....you get the idea.

So Karl and I had originally thought it would be a good

idea to go hit the car wash with the rig on our way to my shop. After all, all of this material was hardened and sitting for ages and there was a goodly amount of dirt and other debris we could wash out at the same time. First we had to stop back at Karl's place and load all the other stuff in the truck to bring along. This consisted of the deck planks, the engine hatches, and the engine STRINGERS, the hardware, the interior sealing boards, firewalls, drive train, and various other bits and pieces. Up and down the stairs went 2 old guys who have no business going up and down the stairs — much less carting stuff along on the trip. Eventually we got it all in.

And off we went to the car wash. Now there is probably no real reason that Karl handed me the high pressure wand first and pointed me towards the bilge of the boat. No reason except chance. Right. But he borrowed a dollar from me and went to feed the machine and I stood on the rail of the trailer wand ready at Karl's command. I squeezed the trigger and whoosh.......coon poop went flying all over the place and what a mess we made. Karl climbed up next no doubt thinking he had a better aim than I only to whoosh some more and OMG – as my grandchildren would say. This was not a good idea. Not only that......but the boat held water.

This boat had been on the hard for how long? Nobody knows. Obviously, for some time before Karl bought it in 1987, it had been dry and land bound. So why so many years later did it hold water? That was not part of the plan. Off we went for my shop some 30 miles away. What's that odor? How toxic is aged coon poop?

Arriving at my shop after an uneventful drive, we pulled in and proceeded to inspect the bilge that would have dried out during the trip. Only it hadn't. There was still water in the bilge. In additional, this boat has a "stepped" bottom and most of the water was trapped in front of the step. And this was not plain old car wash water, no, this was Coon Poop water. The worst kind.

This boat has no bilge plug. Should we drill a hole?

Should we hook up a bilge pump? The only one I had was 12 volts and the only battery I had was 6 volts. Finally Karl hit upon the simplest solution – get out the shop vac. And so we did.

The final part of our plan was to get the boat off the trailer and on jack stands so I could build a cradle to set it on to do the work. The bottom planks on the boat are all fastened from the inside with # 7 fasteners screwed through the battens. I need to get the boat down to a level that I can crawl in and out thru the transom with a minimum of wear and tear on my body, and remove probably close to 700 fasteners. By hand. After another hour or so of literally "jacking" around and wedging and pulling and blocking and a few scary moments, we finished. The boat was at rest. It was 5 O'clock. Neither Karl nor I had eaten since we started this project. We were both beat and I had an 8th grade concert to go to.

We both slept well that night. And, so it begins. The Thunderbolt has begun its journey back.



"IS THIS A PRANK CALL?"

Brian Kramer's 1948 Century Sea Maid becomes a TV Star for a health care commercial by Brian Kramer

Like many things, it started with a simple phone call in late summer 2015...a phone call where I thought a fellow ACBS/Glacier Lakes member was pranking me. Great News - Another Century in film!


