Thompson Boat and Laminated Timber

In 1934 three Thompson men helped establish a new manufacturing company called Unit Structures, Inc. at Peshtigo, Wisconsin. Peter, Christ, and Ted Thompson were half of the owners of Thompson Bros. Boat Mfg. Co., the largest builder of outboard boats in the world. Along with Max Hanisch, Sr., and his sons Max, Jr. and Herbert, the Thompsons got this new endeavor off the ground.

Unit Structures was formed to manufacture structural glued laminated timber arches and beams. The engineered, glued wood technology was brand new to North America, it had never been used or made other than in Europe. Hanisch, Sr. brought the technology from his native Germany. He had studied under the tutelage of Otto Hetzer at Weimar, the man who invented glued laminated timber arches. Hanisch came to USA in 1923 and worked as an architect and civil engineer. His wife and sons joined him in 1925 and he set up a design firm in Racine, Wisconsin.

He received the commission to design a new gymnasium/auditorium for the Peshtigo school district in early 1934. He remembered the "Hetzer" roof arches from his earlier life in Germany. He wanted to design the new gym with glued timber arches. However, he did not have the means to do it himself nor did he have connections with an established firm to add the product to its manufacturing operations.

After presenting his plans to the school board one evening, he lamented out loud about his thoughts of using glued arches. One of the elected school board members was Ted Thompson and he mentioned that he was a woodworker that made boats and he and his brothers had a very large factory with ample space to add products. Of course, this was in the middle of the Great Depression and boat sales were slack. Soon a new enterprise was established with Thompsons providing the skilled wood workers, the space, and the financing the Hanisch family providing the technology and the means to secure work for the new company Unit Structures.

Peter Thompson and Herbert Hanisch were very savvy at details and coming up with means to make the arches and beams. Several US Patents were granted to them for the clamping and gluing jigs used in manufacturing the timbers.

A portion of the second floor of the large Thompson Boat factory was modified to make room for gluing and finishing the laminated arches and beams. The growth of the firm was very slow as the new technology took hold. It was an uphill battle to convince architects and engineers that glued wood was structurally sufficient to hold up roof structures. Slowly the technology was accepted and became a viable building material.

To make the arches and beams, Unit Structures utilized workers from Thompson Boat in her early years. Often times workers would be making boats part of the year and making arches during other months. By 1940 the arch and beam operation was outgrowing the cramped space in the boat shop. A brand-new factory complex was designed by Max Hanisch, Sr. and built adjacent to the boat works. Naturally, the factory buildings were framed with glued laminated arches and beams. Even the gantry crane beams were laminated timber.

Glued laminated timber is made of kiln-dried, dimension lumber suitably selected and graded. Boards are glued end to end to make full lengths laminations. In the early days a plane slope scarf was used to join boards end to end. Since circa 1961, finger joints have been utilized. These long laminations are then glued face to face with structural adhesive to form the beam or arch. Clamping pressure is about 150psi and the laminations are left in the gluing jig for 12 hours minimum. Finishing process includes machine planed surfacing and cutting and drilling for connections and applying pigmented stain is desired. Finished beams and arches are individually wrapped in heavy coated paper to protect them in transport.

Typical applications of glued laminated timber include roof framing for religious structures, gyms and auditoriums, schools, park shelters, indoor water parks and swimming pools, fertilizer storage warehouses, pedestrian and vehicle bridges, electric utility poles, highway noise barriers, and many other uses.

Maurice "Morrie" Rhude joined Unit Structures in 1951 as a structural engineer. His first assignment was the head up the marine laminating operations for making glued laminated frames, keels, stems, and deck beams for US Navy minesweepers. He soon became assistant chief engineer and in 1960 he was promoted to vice president and chief engineer.

From the formation of Unit Structures until July 1962 the Thompsons owned fifty percent of the stock of the company. At that time the firm was sold to a large, multi-national conglomerate out of Pittsburgh called Koppers Company. Unit had factories in Peshtigo and Arkansas and North Carolina when gobbled up by Koppers. For the next ten years, Koppers ran the company but eventually closed the Peshtigo plant and office. Mr. Rhude, not desiring to be transferred to a Koppers' chemical plant in Ohio, remained in the Peshtigo area. He eventually got the laminating plant up and running again but not before Koppers stripped the plant of all her equipment and tooling and even light fixtures. Sentinel Structures, Inc. was formed by Rhude and his six sons were some of the first factory laborers!

Andreas Jordahl Rhude, fifth of the six sons, started working in the plant at age 10 along with his older brothers. That's not an exaggeration. He has worked every facet of production; driven truck; fixed roofs at the factory; done estimating and sales work; been a draftsman and prepared shop drawings; written press releases; published articles about the products and the history; and managed the entire operation.

Some of the most interesting and satisfying work done at the plant are glued laminated timbers for use in restoration of the historic sailing vessel USS Constitution "Old Ironsides". Since 1963 great and compass timbers have been made at Peshtigo for continued maintenance of the ship. From knees to hull and deck planking to masts, the Peshtigo plant has supplied all types of pieces for the ship.

Although Thompson Boat moved away from Peshtigo in 1980, a connection to ship building still exists with Sentinel Structures, Inc. making marine laminated timbers for restoration of old ships and construction of new wooden ships.

Honor Flight, A Day Like None Other

We left Mitchell Field Saturday, May 5 at 7:00 am (cst). Every veteran has a Guardian. Elise my younger daughter, was mine. Honor Flight wants veteran's kids as Guardians so the experience passes to another generation.

Before taking off, a Color Guard presented the colors on the tarmac between our two Honor Flight planes and two vintage WWII planes from the Confederate Air Force, Crites Field. They also did a fly-over for us just before we taxied to the runway.

Arrived Dulles at 9:20 (est) to bright but overcast skies. The spring green was stunningly vibrant shining through. The beauty and renewal of spring was not to be silenced. Our busses had a police escort. If you've ever had a police escort, the feeling is very special. Creating that feeling is exactly the aim of Honor Flight. Regardless of whatever a veteran's role was in preserving freedom, appreciation, respect and honor is directed to every single veteran. It is and truly was amazing!

Our first memorial was the Pentagon Memorial memorializing the 184 lives lost on 9/11. The youngest victim was a 3 year old girl. It's an unusual memorial but understanding the symbolism makes it make perfect sense. The new stonework on the side of the Pentagon is easily identified lacking the patina

of the original. The plane struck the exact center of that side of the building.

Next, to Arlington National Cemetery for the Changing of the Guard. The audience is reminded to be silent out of respect. If you've ever seen it, you'll never forget it. Every foot step and slap on the rifle can be heard. Taps were played.

Surprisingly, there are many other style headstones you'd see in any cemetery. Of course, there are row after row after row of the simple white headstones used for most. Graves are also placed on the side of hills you wouldn't think even possible. No space is wasted. Arlington is the final resting place to over 400,000. And currently has about 20 burials a day.

Next was the Air Force Memorial dedicated in 2006. The three spires reaching into the sky are reminiscent of the contrails made by the Thunderbirds performing the bomb-burst maneuver. Having just "three" spires suggests the missingman formation. The highest stainless-steel spire reaches 270 feet.

The Korean Memorial is impressive and somber. Nineteen 7+ foot tall figures on patrol with four branches of the military are

represented. Figures are made from stainless steel each weighing 1,000 pounds. The statistics of the war are etched in stone side by side for comparison. As all wars statistics are, you'll walk away shaking your head in disbelief and sadness.

Then to the Lincoln Memorial. Abe was waiting. He is huge. But if you don't like steps, buy a postcard. The view from the Memorial is spectacular and fitting.

Vietnam Memorial Wall. Just before the Wall is The Three Soldiers statue(s) representing three ethnic groups of our fighting force. A European-American, an African-American and a Latino-American. I've seen many pictures of this statue and it appeared to be monotone. It's actually in color with skin tone and weapons color suggesting reality.

Approaching the Wall, were two separate veterans in wheel chairs. As I passed the first one I heard him say, "I don't want to go (down there)." As I passed the second, I heard him say the same thing.

Elise and I proceeded to take the very long walk past the length of the very long wall with 58,300 names on it (the most current info I could find). Some names are still added when someone dies from war wounds. There were many people viewing the Wall, searching for names. All are listed chronologically by date of death. Somber is inadequate.

Roosevelt Memorial: President from 1933 to 1945. Many of his great quotes are etched in stone concerning illusive issues that still wait to be solved. His memorial has four large waterfalls increasing in size to represent the increasing challenges of his presidency.

The return to Mitchell. On the flight back, we had "mail call". Each veteran's name was called and given a catalog envelope of mail filled with letters from family, friends and surprise "guests". I began reading and had tears rolling down my face. I had the fattest envelope of anyone.

The reception at Mitchell was utterly unbelievable. It was over the top's top! Scores of every branch of the military lined both sides of the concourse saluting all veterans as we walked between them.

I have often had my salute returned but this was the only time I was saluted! Breath-taking.

Beyond them, was a Drum and Fife band playing patriotic music. And beyond them was the Kettle Moraine High School Band, the full band!

And beyond them were so many well-wishing, appreciative people shaking our hands and thanking us for our service it was amazing! And like being in a movie where WE were the stars! I had to pinch myself that it was really happening.

Friends and family were among them holding signs and waving flags or just waving like crazy!

...and my Guardian (angel) Elise was never more than an "elbow's-length" away.

I am truly blessed to be an American, to have family and many many friends.

God bless America! (and dont't forget to thank Him.)




August 10-12, 2018 Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin
